Patrick spoke to Gallina on May 16, 1969, w/ Terrence O'Reilly present and also a steno. Patrick had a worn statement to the effect that he didnt know where Tony was on the morning in question.

Patrick explains this by saying that he was going on the basis of the facts that Gallina gave. In Patricks mind it was true, but in reality it wasnt the truth. Gallina had given him false facts

Sawyer then does a thing w/ Lenefsky's questions at the first trial which try to get to whether the doubt of where Maynard was on the morning in question arose on May 16 or before. It appears in transcropt of first trial that he had told his family earlier than May 16 that he wasnt sure.
