1796- STONE - for people - direct

(Summary)

Off the jury. Sawyer wants to enter t/ name of defendant Maynard came into case at this point as a result of check by police of the associates of two persons who were stopped on the scene namely Russell Jackson and Warner Guy.

1797 - STONE - for people - direct

(Summary)

Maynard was brought to Sixth Pct on May 17, 1967, and was questioned concerning the murder.

He was not arrested at that time.

1811 - STONE - for people - direct

(Summary)

On August 2, 1967, Dennis Morris was in 6th Pct.

On August 7, 1967, Det. O'Biren and Hanast went to find Maynard. They didnt find him

At 5 pm the same day Maynard called in and they said they wanted to speak to him about this matter the next day and he said he couldnt make it. And they said how about Wednesday and if you want a lawyer that's all right. And he got quite disturbed (disturbed is ~~striken~~).

Next morning there was a message to contact an associate of Mr. Siegel (Maynards attorney).

Spoke to Mr. Siegel on Tuesday evening.

1824 - STONE - for people - ~~xxxxxx~~ cross

Q: Well, did somebody tell you that the shotgun was taken from underneath a man's coat -- clothing?

A: I believe that Dennis Morris said that.

1825 - STONE - for people - cross

Q: Did you speak to a sailor named Robert Crist?

A: Yes, I did.

Q: And when did you sapek to him first, after April the th
ird, 1967, or on that date?

A: I spoke to him that morning.

...

Q: Will you describe how he was acting, when you saw him?

A: Well, his -- I would say he looked kind of disheveled.
I recall, I believe he had his Tee shirt on, and I beli
eve that it was slightly dirty. His hair was slightly
mussed up. I'd say that was his physical appearance.
at that time.

Q: You said that he had a Tee shirt on?

A: Yes.

1826 - STONE - for people - cross

Q: Was he coherent?

A: Well , he was able to answer questions.

Q: Do you remember how he described the black and the white person involved in the incident on April the third, 1967?

A: Well, of the -- of the Negro person, he said he was about I believe about five foot ten, I believe he said he was wearing dark clothing, and was around 18 to 20 years old.

Q: Yes.

A: And I don't recall the weight. The white person, he couldn't -- he could give practically no -- no description of.

1828 - STONE - for people - cross

A: He said that he was unemployed at the time.

Q: Now, what description did Mr. Febles give you of the black and the white persons?

A: Mr. Febles -- of the Negro person he said he was about 5-10 to 6 feet. Also around 18 to 20 years old. About a hundred and sixty pounds, I believe, with a dark -- dark clothing; and that was generally the description.

1829 - STONE - for people - corss

Q: Now, when did you first speak to a Dennis Morris?

A: I beleive it was around the third week in April.

...

Q: And did he give you a description of the Negro and the white?

A: Yes, he did.

Q: Now, you remember the description that he gave you firs of the Negro, if you please.

A: Well, he said that his description was about 5-8 to 5-10 also around 18 to 20, years old. He said t/ he had good posture. He was well spoken. That he had an afro haircut No mustache. And I asked him, if -- if he could picture a person in public lffe, theatre, moview, television who he could give me an idea what this person, his idea of the person might look like. And he said he gave me the name of Martin Luther King. He also. I went and explord it, if this fellow was from the village. And because had he seen him around the Village, was he known in the Village, and he said that he didnt appear like a Village type. And I remember him saying that the two men appear

n ed as he put it as college boys.

Q: Do you remember him telling you, that the black person had a round face?

A: Yes.

Q: Do you remember that he said the age, the hieght-excuse me, was from 5'8, to 5'9 inches tall?

...
A: Yes, 5-8, 5-9.

Q: Now, who did Mr. Morris describe the white?

A: The age and the height was about the same, and he also said that that his opinion that he thought the fellow was of Italian extraction, that he -- I believe he also said he had blonde -- he had sandy hair.

1832 - STONE - for people - cross

Q: Now, with regard to -- let me back up for a second. With regard to the description that Michael Feebles gave you, do you remember Michael Feebles telling you that the black person of the two people he saw, the black and the white, had a very dark complexion?

A: I don't recall that, no.

Q: I show you your notes, and ask you if they refresh your recollection.

A: Yes. I don't recall this, but that is my writing, if he-- he had said that at the time, yes.

Q: So you have no independent recollection of him saying that, but you do recognize your own handwriting?

A: Yes.

Q: Is that right?

A: Yes.

Q: And you would assume that your notes are accurately re-

flecti

A: Right.

Q: The conversation.

A: Yes.

1835 - STONE - for people - cross

Q: Now I have 5 pages of notes to cover the interview you conducted with all 3 of the gentlemen, 5 pages total. Did you ever write down any other notes when you interviewed Christ, Febles, or Morris?

A: No I did not.

Q: Now, I would like you to review your notes which are -- excuse me--People's Ex 50 for Id, and I ask you that whether or not when you conducted your original interviews you asked the three people who claimed to be eye witnesses to describe what happened?

A: Well, I discussed that with each and every one of them.

Q: Did you make any notes to indicate what they said happened?

A: No, I did not.

1836-7-8- STONE - for people - cross

(SUMMARY)

Saw Maynard first on May 17, 1967.

Saw him on W. 10th at 240 at boutique owned by Van Miens.

(Argument w/ bench over who owned boutique)

Van Miens was there. So was Ms. Ayers. So was 4-5 pigs.

Pigs in plainclothes.

Stone saw Maynard come out of boutique in custody of sev1

pigs and being placed in unmarked car.

Believe that he had handcuffs on.

Stone was in charge of the investigation.

He did not have an arrest warrant.

1846 - STONE - for people - cross

Q: And during any of the period from May 17 to August 7, 1967, did you know where Mr. Maynard was?

A: No.

Q: Throughout none of that period, is that your testimony?

A: Yes -- I didnt know specifically where he was living-- at that time.

Q: But you knew whether he was in NYC?

A: From my own personal knowledge, no.

Q: And from the knowledge imparted to you by detectives, did you know?

A: I dont recall.

1846 - STONE -for people - cirss

Q: When you say on August 7 you had a phone conversation w/ a man who identified himself as Mr. Maynard, is that right?

A: That's correct.

Q: And the following day you spoke to Mr. Maynard's atty, is that correct?

A: That's correct.

Q: And that would be on AUGUST 8; is that correct?

A: Yes, sir.

Q: Now, as a result of your phone conversations on August 7 and August 8, did you make any new assignments of personnel to the case?

A: No, I did not.

1847- SOTNE - for people - cross

(March 1968)

Q: Now, isnt it a fact that you learned that Mr. Maynard w
went to Europe thru his atty Mr. Siegel?

A: That's correct. I didnt personally learn it but I --
I think that's where the information first came from,
from Mr. Siegel.

Q: And you knew on May 17, 1967, Mr. Maynard had a valid
passport to Europe, did you not?

A: He had a passport. I dont know if it was valid.

1862 - STONE - for people - cross

Q: In the course of your investigation and in the course of your speaking to Dennis Morris, did Dennis Morris tell you that he was collecting bottles in the small park between west Third and West Fourth?

A: YES.

1795 - STONE - for people - direct
