1945 - HANAST - for defendant - direct

Q: M ... Michael Febles did tell you that he saw the marine fall; is that correct?

A: Yes.

...

Q: Did he give you any description? Did he give you a description of the shotgun blast, for example?

A: He heard the loud blast of a shotgun, turned in his seat saw the marine fall; that's all he said.

Q: And you remember him saying that?

A: Right.

1948 - HANAST - for defendant - direct

Q: And how long did Mr. Febles stay in the precinct?

A: He stayed until the afternoon of -- as I can remember,
3, 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

Q: He was there how many hours, would you say?

A: Ten, 12 hours.

1948 - HANAST - for defendant - direct

Q: Now, did Mr. Febles call you by your first name?

A: Yes, he called me by my first name.

Q: Did you call Mr. Febles by his first name?

A: Yes, I called him by his first name.

1949 - HANAST - for defendant - direct

Q: How many times would you say Mr. Febles had been in the Sixth Pct from April 3, 1967 to date?

A: How many times?

Q: Yes.

A: 25, 30.

Q: Have you seen him there with his wife and whild?

A: Yes, I have seen his wife and child there.

1949 - HANAST - for defendant - direct

Q: Did you observe Mr. Febles calling other police officers by thir first name?

A" Mes, as -- as time went by, he did, yes.

1954 - HANAST - for defendant - direct

Q: Now do you remember what Dennis Morris told you the sailor was doing, when he first observed the sailor?

A: He was yelling.

...

Q: You remember Dennis Morris, telling you that the sailor was raising cain?

A: Yes, I remember that.

Q: Did you ask Dennis Morris, what he meant by the sailor raising cain?

A: Well, that he was very loud and yelling.

1956 - HANST - for defendant - direct

Q: Now, did Dennis Morris tell you that he saw the Negro who was with the white take his jacket off?

A: I seem to remember something about that, yes.

1956 - HANAST - for defendant - direct

Q: You remember Dennis Morris referring to the white as a white boy and referring to the Negro as a Negro boy?

A: That is the way he explained it to me.

Q: He did use those terms, is that right?

A: I believe he did.

1956 - HANAST - for defendant - direct

Q: Did Dennis Morris tell you, that on the morning in question --

(Whereupon, counsel approaches the diagram)

Q: (Continuing) -- he was picking up bottles in the playground which appears on People's Exhibit 1 between Third and Fourth Streets?

A: I believe he did.

1959 - HANAST - for defendant - direct

Q: Now, did Mr. Fox tell you, that on April the second, 1967, he picked a Negro and a white up, in his cab?

A: Yes, he did.

Q: You remember how he described the Negro that he picked up in his cab?

...

A: Male Negro, he describe about 22, 5'9, broad shoulders, n neat, Busky type hair, more than the average Negro would wear. Blue polo shirt. Blue windbreaker, and that is all I can recall of that.

Q: Did you ask him what he meant by more hair than the average Negro would wear?

A: Well, what he meant by that was most Negroes that he saw wore the hair really short cropped, and kinky, at that time.

Q: And that is what he told you?

A: Yes, sir. And this was a little - that the person picked out was

out was a little longer, maybe an inch high, you know.

Q: It was more than the average Negro?

A: Than the average ones that he knwe, yes, that is what he meant by that.

1960 - HANAST - for the defendant 0- direct

Q: Now, do you remember whether or not Mr. Fox told you, that the NEgro that he picked up, in his cab, on Arpil the second, 1967, looked a little on the faggy side?

A: That was his words, yes.
